20 Questions to spark a family story

Family storytelling often starts with a good question. For example:

1. Where were grandma and grandpa born?
2. Do we have family living in our countries? Where?
3. How did our family come to live here in this country/town?
4. Where did Mum/Dad grow up? Where did they go to church?
5. Where did Mum and Dad meet? What attracted them to each other?

6. Where was I/brother/sister born? What do you remember of that day?
7. How did you choose my name? And what does it mean?
8. Where was I/brother/sister baptised? What do you remember of that day?
9. Which person in the family am I most like?
10. What was a mistake you made, and what did you learn from that experience?
11. What was school like when you were a boy/girl?
12. Where did Mum/Dad make their sacraments? What was it like?
13. What Bible stories did you read when you were growing up? Did you have a favourite?
14. Do you have a favourite saint / inspiring figure?
15. What were some of the jobs our grandparents had when they were young?
16. Were any of our relatives in a war? Where? What was that like for them?
17. As a child, what did Mum/Dad want to be when they grew up?
18. What was your favourite food when you were my age?
19. What was the first movie you ever saw? Did you like it?

Further tips

- Find the time that works best for your family’s storytelling, e.g., in the car on a long drive, or at mealtimes, or bedtime stories.
- Photos, videos, and family memorabilia can trigger a story. E.g., dig out those rosary beads at the bottom of the drawer and tell the story: who gave them to you? On what occasion? What do they mean to you?

- Discover the Bible as a wonderful source of stories imparting deep values.
